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8:15 – 9:30 a.m.	Putting Green Cultivation, Timing, and Recovery <i>Emily Braithwaite, Oregon State University</i> This presentation discusses several research projects evaluating how putting green cultivation practices and timing influence turf recovery and playing conditions. Topics will include cultivation type (hollow vs solid), timing, sand topdressing, with a focus on recovery time, organic matter, infiltration, and surface performance.

It highlights how landscape design, plant establishment needs, mature trees, irrigation efficiency, and long-term maintenance all influence whether turfgrass conversions produce meaningful and lasting water savings.

As architects, we shape these lines with two goals in mind: visual appeal and strategic intent. Aesthetically, the curve and flow of a line create a composition that's pleasing to the eye and sets the tone for how a hole feels from the tee box. Strategically, that same line dictates angles, risk, and reward, subtly guiding how a golfer plots their path of play. Even a slight shift in a line can change both the way a hole is played and the way it's experienced.

Emily Braithwaite

Emily is a Ph.D. student in Plant Biology & Pathology at Oregon State University, and also helps manage the OSU Turfgrass Diagnostic Lab. She received an M.Sc. in 2024 in Horticulture, and has over 10 years of research experience in turfgrass management. Her research currently focuses on optimizing surveying, collection, and management of plant-parasitic nematodes in cool-season putting greens, as well as resistance management of nematicides. Prior to starting her graduate education, she was a research technician at OSU working primarily on diseases of golf course putting greens.



Kelly Kopp, Ph.D.

Kelly Kopp is a Professor and Extension Specialist in the Plants, Soils & Climate department at Utah State University, where her research efforts are focused on landscape water conservation and sustainable turfgrass management. She serves on the Board of Directors of USU's Center for Water Efficient Landscaping and is board member and past president of the Utah Water Conservation Forum. She works directly with many of the federal, state, and municipal agencies that are working toward achieving water use efficiency in the state of Utah, the Intermountain West, and beyond.



Hannah Rivedal, Ph.D.

Hannah Rivedal, Ph.D., is a Research Plant Pathologist with the USDA Agricultural Research Service. Her research program addresses plant pathology challenges facing the forage seed, grass seed, and hemp industries of the Pacific Northwest, with a focus on developing strategies for early and accurate disease diagnosis and detection, fungicide resistance management, and integrated pest management.



Connor Dougherty

A golf course architect with Jackson Kahn Design, whose interest in design was sparked by studying Alister MacKenzie's Pasatiempo while caddying in a US Amateur Qualifier. Following his studies at the University of Oregon, he built a foundation in golf course construction, spending two and a half years with Landscapes Unlimited and three and a half years with Greenscape Methods, working on-site across a range of high-profile projects. That field experience, combined with years spent sketching routings and design solutions, led him to join the JKD design team in December 2021, where he now works with clients to create distinctive, playable golf courses.



Chava McKeel

Chava serves as the Director of Government Affairs for the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America. Since joining the association in December 1997, McKeel has played a pivotal role in shaping public policy and regulatory compliance strategies for golf course management nationwide. Her work focuses on navigating critical regulatory issues affecting superintendents, including environmental compliance, pesticide regulations, water conservation, and federal Environmental Protection Agency policies. In addition to her regulatory advocacy, McKeel actively engages with GCSAA regional chapters, represents the association at industry policy forums, and serves on the board of the National Alliance for Accessible Golf.
